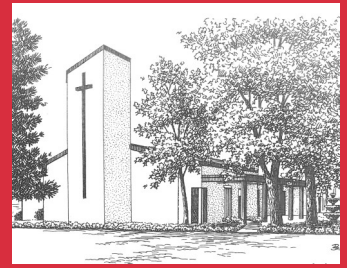

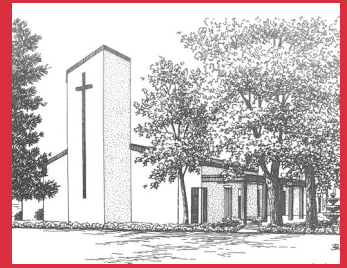


Average Attendance for Online & In-Person Worship Services For November:

Session Highlights

Session discussed the pros and cons of having a full-time pastor vs. a part-time pastor. A part-time pastor would be more affordable than a full-time pastor. However, the decision is to search for a **full-time pastor** so he/she will truly have time to address all of our pastoral and administrative needs.

Session also discussed upcoming parking lot resurfacing and the development of a new church directory with photographs. Last but not least, session finished developing a 2026 budget for presentation to the congregation in January.

Church Nominating Committee

For the next month or so, the Nominating Committee is focusing on finding nominees for the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). The PNC will create a profile for Northkirk to post on a pastor website (like a vacancy announcement), review profiles of prospective candidates, and eventually recommend a specific candidate for congregational approval.

After finding nominees for the PNC, the Nominating Committee will turn to the job of finding nominees for Deacon and Elder positions. Announcements will be made later about that process.

Do You have a Sense of Purpose?

A reader wrote in to Helen Dennis, a columnist on issues of aging and retirement, asking her how essential is it to have a sense of purpose in our lives as we age. Many studies on aging say people live longer and thrive if they have a purpose and reason for living. The reader felt she didn't have a strong sense of purpose and was wondering if this concept is overrated.

Helen writes we are often called to find our calling but 91% of people questioned say they feel pressured at some points in their lives to find purpose. As a result, something new has developed called purpose anxiety. It's the stress, fatigue, insecurity, and frustration that comes from trying to find one's purpose. Some people think of purpose with a capital P-something that has to be big. Dr. Jordan Grundy, author of "The Purpose Code", says it's the little p's that can count such as hobbies, gardening, singing, volunteering.

So, is purpose important? The National Institutes of Health reports that folks with purpose are less likely to have heart attacks, strokes and dementia. They engage in exercise and healthy habits. They manage stress and better sleep. They have better cognitive function and overall well-being. And they live longer.

It is easy to find a sense of purpose here at Northkirk. Our music program can always use singers, bell ringers and musicians. Deacons can use help serving our church family and our community. Come to our monthly committee meetings to hear about all the options about where you can help. We have monthly work parties. And Northkirk is always open to new suggestions if you have an idea for something to fulfill a purpose for you and our church.

May you enjoy a life of joy, love, purpose and good health.

Keto Pumpkin Cheesecake

Ingredients

- 2 cups almond flour
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 3 tablespoons granulated stevia sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- FILLING:
- 2 packages (8 oz each) cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup granulated stevia sugar
- 1 can (15 oz) canned pumpkin
- 1-1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, mix together almond flour, melted butter, sugar substitute, cinnamon and vanilla extract. Press mixture into the bottom of a 9-in. springform pan and about 1 inch up the sides. Bake until slightly puffed and browned, 18-20 minutes; Let completely cool.
2. In a large bowl, beat cream cheese at medium speed until fluffy. Beat in sugar substitute, canned pumpkin, pie spice, vanilla and salt until well combined.
3. In a separate large bowl, beat heavy cream on medium-high speed until stiff peaks form. Fold into pumpkin batter. Transfer filling into cooled pie crust; spread into an even layer. Cover; refrigerate at least 6 hours or overnight.
4. Loosen sides from pan with a knife. Remove rim from pan; serve.

Twelve Days of Christmas

Trying to find one's spiritual bearings amidst the commercial season and the flurry of social occasions before Christmas can be difficult. Some persons concede the time before December 25 and observe the 12 days of Christmas.

About the time the American Revolution was brewing, in England Roman Catholics were prohibited from openly practicing their faith. In order that children would be educated in the faith, special meanings were planted in a song they sang. It was a reminder of the great teaching of the Christian faith. As sort of a musical rosary, instead of beads, the verses highlighted church teachings to remind children of special prayers.

"On the first day of Christmas, my true love gave to me, a partridge in a pear tree." The mother partridge will feign injury to decoy predators or danger away from her young. Suffering on behalf of

those whom you love, the partridge is a symbol for Jesus, born on the first day of Christmas.

"On the second day of Christmas, my tru love gave to me, two turtle doves,: the Old and New Testaments.

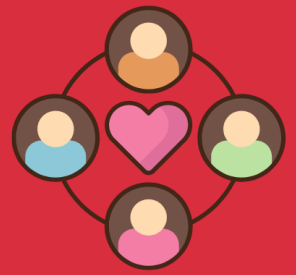
"On the third day... three French hens." The great theme of Christian response is summarized in 1 Corinthians 13: faith, hope, and love.

"On the fourth day... four calling birds," the four gospels: Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John.

"Five... five golden rings." The Pentateuch, the first five books of the Old Testament attributed to Moses, i.e., Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy.

Twelve Days of Christmas (Continued)

“Six...six geese a-laying,” remember the six days of creation.

“Seven...seven swans a’swimming,” i.e., the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, listed in Romans 12:6. The gifts of the Spirit are prophecy, ministry. Teaching, exhortation or encouragement, generosity, diligence, and cheerfulness.

“Eight maids a’milking” reminds of the eight Beatitudes, the teaching of Jesus that began the Sermon on the Mount, “Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are...” (Matthew 5)

“Nine ladies dancing” represent the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22). These are the ways we can see God’s power in the lives of others. God’s presence is revealed through: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

“Ten lords a-leaping” are a reminder of the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20).

“Eleven pipers piping” symbolize the eleven faithful disciples.

And Twelve Drummers drumming” reveal the twelve points of belief in the Apostles’ Creed. This is the basic statement of faith of the Christian faith which begins, “I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of Heaven and Earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord...”
